INFRASTRUCTURE


Sprawled across a 60-acre verdant stretch, IRMA's fully residential campus boasts state-of-the-art infrastructure, fully computerized facilities, an excellent library, 24-hour internet connectivity, and modern teaching aids among other things. The general store and an AMUL Parlour purveying snacks and other products till late at night cater to the daily requirements of residents. IRMA's dispensary has a doctor visiting on all working days besides a full-time resident nurse who is contactable during emergencies.

IRMA's students are required to stay in hostels, which are spread across 14 blocks comprising single furnished rooms. Each floor has a furnished common reading room, which is also used for receiving quests.



LIBRARY

The Library is housed in a spacious three-storied building. It supports the teaching and research programmes of the Institute. The present collection includes 44727 books, 120 CD-ROMS, 919 microfiche and microfilms, 2897 MTS reports, 1073 OTS reports, 3680 Fieldwork reports, 676 DIS reports, and 169 SIS reports. In addition to this, the Library is subscribing to 123 periodicals, 15800+ e-Journals, 13000+ eBooks and six online databases, including newspapers and popular magazines during the year during. The Library is fully automated and offers services of photocopying, scanning, reference, inter-libraryloan, and bibliographical search assistance to the users. It is equipped with facilities such as Koha OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) and EzProxy (Off-Campus) remote access software.

IT FACILITIES

As per IRMA's policy, IT centre believes in providing contemporary and agile services to its community including students. The centre manages an intranet by deploying high-end computing devices and networks with multi-layered security apparatus to facilitate secured access to the users on campus and while on the move. The institute also has forayed into mobile compliant services as well. While on campus the users have value-added services with Wi-Fi network interface which works seamlessly with intranet



through single-sign-on services. The institute has consciously invested in its digital infrastructure to facilitate intranet services, internet services with adequate bandwidth (currently 450mbps and annually grows) and failover services. Special attention is given to the students on campus with assured 1:1 bandwidth for internet access with subnets. The students also enjoy special services related to network printers on demand which are remotely controlled and administered. In addition, students also enjoy the facility of four well-equipped computer laboratories on campus. The website of IRMA has graduated to be a portal with micro websites to cater to various diverse requirements. The current portal is capable of handling all the desired services which are secured. Special attention is given to each students as well as group activities of the students related to their academic programmes. The website also is mobile complaint. The digital infrastructure at IRMA is continuously updated and as per the institute's policy the students' computer committees constantly engage with the IT centre with continuous feedback for providing quality service on demand.

OTHER FACILITIES

The Indoor Sports Complex and gymnasium cater to fitness and sports' enthusiasts. There are also facilities for sports like football, cricket, badminton, and table tennis. The air-conditioned 400seat auditorium has an excellent audiovisual projection system ideal for lectures, presentations, and variety programmes.





POST GRADUATE DIPLOMA IN MANAGEMENT (RURAL MANAGEMENT)

PGDM (RM) is a two-year fully residential programme leading to a Post Graduate Diploma in Management (Rural Management).

The curriculum of our two-year fully-residential program in rural management includes courses on marketing, finance, development, operations, organization design and systems in the rural context. It is designed with an emphasis on experiential learning through two internship segments, which provides four months of on-field learning. Areas of focus include cooperatives, dairying, agribusiness, rural finance, microfinance, rural marketing, development consulting and public policy, development project execution, social change interventions, big data, operations and analytics.

CURRICULUM DESIGN*

Classroom Segments

The classroom segment in the PGDM (RM) curriculum has six terms comprising of 96 credit points. The courses in the first year cover the basics of rural management and development. Term I and Term II comprise of core courses, which are compulsory for all PGDM (RM) students. Courses from Term III to Term VI are a combination of core and elective courses. To ensure that students do not miss out on relevant courses, there are four obligatory elective courses of 6 credits in Term III and each student has to choose 3.0 credits from that. The Obligatory Electives are such

as Project Management, Investment & Risk Management, Public Policy Analysis and Advanced Business Analytics. The courses in Term I and Term II cover foundation and contextual courses in rural management while Term III to Term VI includes various functional areas and development-focused courses.

Besides core courses, students also take up compulsory value-added credit courses during Term I and Term II, such as Community-oriented Research Methods, Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA), Gender and Development Lab, and Spreadsheet Modeling.

Students are required to choose total 31.5 credits (6 credits in Term - III, 7.5 credits in Term – IV, 9 credits in Term – V and Term – VI both the terms) worth of electives in Term III to Term VI as per the details given below.

There are eight groups under which electives are offered at IRMA. These groups are:

Elective Courses

Elective courses are offered in Term – III to Term – VI with core courses. Students are required to choose 6 credits in Term – III, 7.5 credits in Term – IV, 9 credits in Term – V and Term – VI both the terms. Students are required to choose total 31.5 credits worth of electives in Term III to Term VI.

- Elective courses may vary depending on the need of participants and recommendation of the Academic Council.
- Each student is required to take total 31.5 credits (6 credits in Term - III, 7.5 credits in Term - IV, 9 credits in Term - V and Term - VI both the term of elective courses).
- A 3.0 credit course is equivalent to 20 classroom contact sessions of 90 minutes each; it requires the students to put in 80-90 hours of work outside the classroom. A 1.5 credit course will involve 10 contact sessions of 90 minutes' duration and about 45 hours of preparatory work.

Village Fieldwork Segment (VFS)

The Village Fieldwork Segment (VFS) is an essential and a very distinct segment of the PGDM (RM) programme, which is the flagship academic activity of the Institute of Rural Management, Anand. The VFS unlocks substantial value in terms of experiential learning of rural life for the participants. It also provides a firsthand exposure of challenges and prospects in rural hinterlands of our country. Moreover, this fieldwork segment gives them an opportunity to get involved in practical activities of the host organization.

Duration of the fieldwork segment is approximately nine weeks and is



worth eight credits. It is held after the first term of the classroom segment. The VFS term comprises three components: (i) Exploratory Study of the Village (ESV), (ii) Theme Paper, (iii) Rural Action Component (RAC). The ESV is designed in such a way to get the requisite exposure to the participants towards rural demography, society, economy, polity, and culture. The participants get opportunity to study the local resources, institutions, governance, and other aspects of human development and sustainability. The TP is a theme-based study which the participants need to figure out themselves while in the village and it must be related to one of the key challenges in the village. The RAC is a small action-oriented component assigned and mentored by the local host organization.

The duration of preparatory to VFS is approximately one week during which participants undergo intensive training in Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) techniques and detailed orientation programme by the experienced faculty and alumni on understanding village, its institutions, development programmes, and governance, and making inroads to rural lives, and practical knowhows of fieldwork, etc. The duration of actual

stay in the village is approximately seven weeks during which participants undertake the three components: ESV, Theme paper, and RAC. The participants are divided into small groups of two to three members and sent to rural areas in different parts of the country. Each group is attached to a local host organization. Members of the group stay in pre-identified villages and interact directly with the villagers. IRMA faculty members interact closely with participants at all stages of the fieldwork segment. The participants make a presentation and/or submit a report of their

RAC before returning to IRMA. After reaching IRMA, the participants work on their field reports and within a week deliver presentations of their fieldwork to a panel of faculty members at IRMA. The participants submit a detailed VFS report having three sections corresponding to the three components. Though these three sections have interconnections, they are written in such a way they can be evaluated independently. The evaluation of VFS is based on the report as well as two presentations – (i) at the local host organization on RAC and (ii) at IRMA on ESV and Theme paper.



Summer Internship Segment (SIS)

The duration of the Summer Internship Segment (SIS) is ten weeks, and the segment is worth eight credits. It is held after the third term of the classroom segment and at the beginning of the programme's second year. The SIS term comprises three components:

- (i) Evaluation by the Faculty Guide,
- (ii) Presentation of the SIS report, and
- (iii) Evaluation by the host organisation.


The Summer Internship Segment (SIS) exposes participants to the functioning of organisations and

allows them to apply, test, and polish skills acquired in the classroom.

The participants develop practical skills and gain a realistic idea of the managerial functions of organisations. The SIS helps participants develop critical abilities required on the job: working effectively with others, thinking and acting positively, learning to manage people, and improving written and oral communication skills. The internship opportunity also likely helps participants bag preplacement offers.





Admissions Process for Indian Nationals

Selection Process for Indian Nationals

Stage I: Short-listing based on CAT/XAT Scores

 Candidates will be short listed based on their CAT 2021 / XAT 2022 scores (whichever is higher).

(Students will be informed on the shortlist decision through email / SMS to their registered email address and phone number)

Stage II: Interview Process

The stage II of IRMA admissions process consists of Written Ability Test (WAT), and Personal Interview (PI).

Written Ability Test (WAT)

A shortlist of candidates will be called for the next round of selection, where they will have to appear for a Written Ability Test (paper-pen based written test of 30 minutes) on the day of their Personal Interview immediately after the briefing of the Admissions Chair. Candidate will need to write about 200/300 words on a given topic and upload the scanned copy using his / her login credentials on IRMA website. It is designed to evaluate a candidate's rural aptitude as well as written communication skills.

Personal Interview (PI)

Candidates shortlisted for interviews will be assessed on their managerial abilities, communication skills, and suitability for the Institute's program. In view of the fact that the PGDM (RM) caters to a very specific clientele; namely organisations contributing to broad-based rural development in India, the candidate's attitude towards rural management is of particular importance.

Personal Interview will be conducted in **OFFLINE** and **ONLINE** mode. Candidate will be given an option for selecting mode of Personal Interview.


Selection Process for NRI Candidate

Candidates will be shortlisted for an Online Personal Interview (OPI) based on their GMAT (taken on or after January 2017) / CAT2021 OR XAT2022 scores for PGDM (RM) 2022 - 24.



Online Personal Interview (OPI) will be conducted during 3rd week of April 2022.

Final selection will be done based on GMAT scores (taken on or after January 2017) / CAT2021 OR XAT2022 scores and OPI score. The marks obtained in the GMAT (taken on or after January 2017) / CAT2021 OR XAT2022 test and the marks obtained in OPI will be reduced to the equivalent marks of 60 and 40 respectively. An overall merit list will be prepared based on the total marks obtained out of these 100 marks.

The Institute has its own Dispensary in the campus. A doctor is visiting Dispensary on all working days on scheduled time. FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE AT IRMA*

IRMA Scholarship

20 merit-based scholarships worth Rs. 1.17 crore for the students of Post Graduate Diploma in Management (Rural Management). Out of the 20 scholarships, 10 would be awarded to general pool and 10 would be awarded exclusively to female candidates.

The scholarship amount will be up to 50% of the tuition fee. The scholarship in the first year will be based on the overall selection merit of IRMA's admissions process, and in the second year will be awarded based on the academic performance, i.e., the CGPA of the first year at IRMA.

Mirae Asset Foundation (MAF) Scholarship

MAF provide 4 scholarships in a year. 2 Scholarship shall be awarded for the 2nd year students and 2 scholarship shall be awarded to the 1st year students. Scholarship amount is Rs. 5 lakhs per students per year. The scholarship amount will be evaluated every year and will be decided at the beginning of the year.

SC Scholarships

This scholarship covers the entire cost of education of SC students are available at IRMA. The Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India (www.socialjustice.nic.in) has allocated 4 scholarships to IRMA for SC students. The scholarship covers tuition fees, non-refundable charges, lodging and boarding expenses, cost of books, stationery, and a personal computer.

ST Scholarships

A full scholarship is allocated for ST students by the Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Government of India (www.tribal.nic.in). The amount of the scholarship covers tuition fees, boarding and lodging expenses, book grant, and a one-time grant for the purchase of a personal computer.

IDFC First Bank MBA Scholarship

Providing financial assistance to meritorious students from economically weaker sections of society who are keen on pursuing an MBA degree or its equivalent from one of India's reputed institutions. Selected students are getting scholarship of Rs. 1,00,000/- (per annum) to pursue their MBA or equivalent studies at selected Indian Business School. Institute of Rural Management Anand is one of the selected Institutes for IDFC First Bank MBA Scholarship.

Tuition Fee Waiver (TFW) Scheme

The Tuition Fee Waiver Scheme, as per the AICTE rules, is available at IRMA.

Educational Loans

Educational loans are available from various banks to candidates enrolling at IRMA.

National Academic Depository (NAD)

It is mandatory for all students to register on National Academic Depository (www.nad.gov.in) before joining IRMA, if selected.

About National Academic Depository (NAD)

The vision of National Academic Depository (NAD) is born out of an initiative to provide an online store house of all academic awards.
